Quick Overview

- The goal of the Certificate Experience is to foster nonprofit professionals: ***To be a self aware, reflective, ethical leader with a strong sense of professionalism, commitment and passion for the nonprofit sector.***
- The Certificate Experience focuses on the "learning" and "experience" required to be a committed, competent and effective leader and manager within the Texas Nonprofit Sector.
- Designed for both professional staff and volunteer leaders.
- This Certificate Experience seeks to raise the bar on the practice of professional and volunteer leadership.
- Meta, macro and micro approaches and perspectives and management in Central Texas and other regions of the state. It will foster a **Nonprofit Sector community of practice**, developing a cadre of informed, motivated and effective nonprofit professional and volunteer practitioner leaders who will build their professional networks so as to support each other (throughout their careers) in the difficult work of strengthening societal resources and assets for assuring the community's quality of life.
- Over a ten month period (August 2010 – May 2011), 20 full day sessions for more than 160 contact hours of instruction.

Special Aspects

Personality Style and Leadership Type assessment

Each participant will complete a Personal Assessment - The **Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI)** - prior to the first learning opportunity, in keeping with the Certificate's focus on attaining a disciplined view of self, of the organizations in which we operate, and the overall environment of the Nonprofit Sector of Texas. The first learning opportunity will be "Developing Your Personal Leadership Style." It will incorporate learning from the individual and collective MBTI assessments. Each participant will also have the opportunity of a one-hour private consultation with the MBTI administrator to optimize their learning from and application of their MBTI assessment.

Ethics & Best Practices

A special focus on ethics, ethical behavior, the implications of Sarbanes Oxley, and best practices within the Nonprofit Sector will be integrated within every session rather than being dealt with artificially within separate sessions.

Continuing Education Units

Participants will earn **Continuing Education Units (CEUs)** from Austin Community College. These may be eligible for use in meeting professional certification requirements.

Access to ACC Resources

Each participant gets an ACC identification number that allows access to all the resources available to ACC students, including library resources and internet access at ACC facilities.

Required Activity

Learning Assessments

Participants will complete learning assessments throughout the Certificate Experience to reflect their learning of that session's subject matter.

Cohort Project

Participants will be expected to complete a group-work assignment that is designed to be beneficial for individuals, organizations and the nonprofit sector in general.

Application process

Applicants are encouraged to complete the application as soon as possible, and notifications of acceptance into the Certificate Program will be made on a rolling basis until the class of 2010 is full. Those invited to join the Certificate Experience class will be advised at the time of acceptance on payment requirements, final session schedules, and other program details.

Tuition

Tuition for the 20 all-day sessions, Induction and Graduation ceremonies, all handouts and resource materials, and CEUs - is **\$3,000**. Participants working for or key volunteers of organizations who are TANO members receive a 10% tuition discount - Discounts are only for participants paying full tuition.

Scholarships

Our ability to offer scholarships is directly related to the funding we can acquire for that purpose. Those seeking scholarship assistance should outline their requirements in the area provided on the Application Form including the area available for general comments:

For Whom Is this Certificate Program Intended?

The Certificate Experience is designed for individuals already engaged in or aspiring to be volunteer and/or professional leaders and managers within the Nonprofit Sector. It is a serious course of study requiring a strong commitment and investment of its participants. In addition, "the Certificate Experience" will benefit:

- Local, state and other government employees seeking greater understanding of the nonprofit sector.
- Students interested in supplementing their current education.

When are the Certificate Participants be selected?

All applicants will be notified of their acceptance status no later than June of the year in which your Class begins (e.g., June 15, 2010 for Class of 2010/2011, etc.). However, acceptances are on a rotating basis. Once the class is filled with qualified participants, no additional applications will be accepted regardless of any stated deadlines.

What does "the Certificate Experience" focus on?

"The Certificate Experience" is designed to focus on the skills needed for pragmatic day-to-day leadership and management of a nonprofit organization. It seeks to connect knowledge and practice as well as build on the experiences and competencies of those who are participants in the program.

More effective nonprofit organizations led by knowledgeable and committed professionals and volunteer leaders is our goal. Effective organizations are those that achieve success by: Engaging stakeholders in planning, Developing goals aligned with a vision, Allocating resources in a manner consistent with its goals, Using appropriate measures to determine success, Communicating widely about its methods and progress and evaluating effectiveness based on goals.

What do graduates receive?

- A **Certificate in Nonprofit Leadership & Management** granted by the Texas Association of Nonprofit Organizations and the Center for Community-Based & Nonprofit Organizations at Austin Community College.
- Continuing Education Units which may be used to meet other professional and/or accreditation requirements.
- A professional library of useful resources (i.e., the course handouts).
- Public recognition of their participation in "the Certificate Experience" and seriousness in seeking professional development and advancement.
- The opportunity to participate and network in a select group of individuals committed to promoting greater excellence within the Nonprofit Sector of Texas.

Frequently Asked Questions (*contin.*)

When are the sessions?

Certificate sessions are held on a Friday and Saturday once a month for 10 months, starting in late August and concluding with graduation in May. Each learning opportunity will be 7 hours long (from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm), with a 60-minute lunch break (not included as learning time). Sessions are held at the Highland Business Center of Austin Community College at 5930 Middle Fiskville Road, unless otherwise noted.

Will I receive any mentoring or coaching?

"The Certificate Experience" is all about mentoring and coaching and the development of long-term relationships. Session leaders as well as the Certificate co-chairs, as well as fellow participants will be available and open to such relationships.

When is graduation?

Graduation occurs in June.
